They would ride in boats from the warm Atlantic waters of Portugal to the freezing cold waters off the coast of Iceland. Bethany College is deeply rooted in the Lutheran intellectual tradition and boldly open to insights from other religious and secular traditions. Our spiritual and religious life is decidedly ecumenical and interfaith, serving and providing opportunities for students, faculty, and staff of any or no religious background. Each week, time is held apart across campus for Chapel Break, a time of reflection, community building, spiritual practice, and religious ritual and tradition. Additionally, a variety of campus ministry organizations develop programs through which students forge affirming community and learn to live out Christ's radical message of love.



Lutheran Campus Ministry at Kansas State University works to help K-State students experience God's love and share it with the world! We share God's love with students through weekly worship, Bible study, meals, and pastoral presence on campus, as well as fellowship and service events and retreats.

Westwood House, primarily serving Washington University and Saint Louis University, help students build an honest, safe community as they wrestle through questions of identity and vocation during their college and early professional years with a focus on social justice. We have dinner and worship every Sunday and Pastor Tina is at both campuses during the week. We offer a variety of weekly & monthly events for undergrad, grad students & young professionals.



A second Westwood House provides a ecumenical collaboration between LCM-KU and Wesley KU devoted to helping students know that **“God loves you—no exceptions.”** We seek to feed students in body, mind, and spirit through our weekly worship, Bible study, community meals, and access to our food pantry. We are also present on campus every week.

Last Month: Seed Balls

Make Dog and Cat Treats for Blessing of the Animals

May 13 at Coleman Hawkins Park we will be hosting a Blessing of the Animals and we need your help. We want to show hospitality and invite those who come to worship on Sunday. We will be handing out bags of dog and cat treats with a special invitation inside. Please bake as many treats as you want and drop them off at church **by May 07!** Youth will put the packages together. Thank you.

Homemade Peanut Butter Dog Treats

Ingredients

*Baking time will vary depending on the size and thickness of the treats.

2/3 cup pumpkin puree

1/4 cup peanut butter*

2 large eggs

2 1/2 cups whole wheat flour

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a silicone baking mat; set aside.
2. In the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat pumpkin puree, peanut butter and eggs on medium-high until well combined

-
- about 1-2 minutes.
 3. Gradually add 2 1/2 cups flour at low speed, beating just until incorporated. Add an additional 1/4 cup flour at a time just until the dough is no longer sticky.
 4. Working on a lightly floured surface, knead the dough 3-4 times until it comes together. Using a rolling pin, roll the dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Using cookie cutters, cut out desired shapes or just cut strips and place onto the prepared baking sheet.
 5. Place into oven and bake until the edges are golden brown, about 20-25 minutes.
 6. Let cool completely.

Homemade Tuna Cat Treats

Ingredients

6 ounces undrained tuna
1 cup flour
1 cup cornmeal
1 egg
2 T water



Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
2. Place all ingredients into mixing bowl, stir well until soft dough forms.
3. Let dough rest for 10 minutes.
4. Cover large surface with cornmeal and roll dough out until 1/4 inch thick.
5. Use either a small cookie cutter or knife to cut into shapes or squares.
6. Place on parchment paper lined cookie sheet and bake for 15-20 minutes.
7. Let cool!
